A Memoir


Trish O'Kane

Trish O'Kane is a self-professed accidental birder and accidental teacher. When Hurricane Katrina destroyed her New Orleans home and community, Trish's questions for meaning shifted from How can I make the world a better place? What can I do? to How should I be?.

Through the creation of an afterschool mentoring program that pairs college undergraduates with local elementary school children, Birding to Change the World tells Trish's story of learning to be a citizen of a place, not just of the world, through ornithology and conservation, community organizing, and social justice work. Trish's story will help make visible to students the responsibility they have of being engaged, informed citizens of their college towns and cities to make a positive difference to their communities' needs.

Their various fates and struggles cause their community dynamic to sizzle and sometimes explode: The wealthy Ammar family employs young Maysoon Baladi, whose own family struggles financially, to clean up after their spoiled teenagers. Meanwhile, Marcus Salameh confronts his father in an effort to protect his younger sister for "dishonoring" their name. Only a trip to Palestine, where Marcus experiences an unexpected and dramatic transformation, can bridge this seemingly unbridgeable divide between the two generations.





Sitting Pretty

The View from My Ordinary Resilient **Disabled Body**

Rebekah Taussig

When Rebekah Taussig-who has a Ph.D. in disability studies and is disabled herself—created the Instagram account @ sitting_pretty, she was driven by the fact that disabled people are not adequately represented. She felt disabled people didn't see stories about themselves that they could relate to, and that nondisabled people have a narrow, one-dimensional view of disability. In her work, Dr. Taussig strives to paint a more nuanced portrait of disability. It can be tough and uncomfortable, but it can also be just fine, it can be ordinary, it can even be fulfilling.

In this memoir-in-essays, Dr. Taussig expands on this message, illustrating the need for more stories and more voices to understand the diversity of humanity. Sitting Pretty challenges your students to be patient and vigilant, practical, and imaginative, kind and relentless, as we as a society set out to write an entirely different story.


Trust Your Mind




The Value of the World Around Us

Partha Dasgupta

Cambridge University economist Sir Partha Dasgupta lays out a seminal new approach to economics that asks: What if we were to put a value on nature just as we value everything else?

As warming reshapes our planet, the Arctic—a region that once seemed unchangeable and immutable, beyond the reach of modern problems—is quickly coming undone. While the old cold world can still be glimpsed in the movements of caribou, the hidden lives of wolves, or the hunting skill of an Inupiat elder, look closer and you'll find a new Arctic emerging in its place.

In Frostlines, Neil Shea reveals how the beauty, chaos, and power of change in the far north are reflected in the individual lives of people and animals. Structured as a revolution around the pole from east to west, Shea sojourns with a wolf pack on Canada's Ellesmere Island and travels among the Indigenous Netsilingmiut and Tlicho peoples of Nunavut and the Northwest Territories. He tracks dwindling caribou herds across Alaska and measures the potential of oil and gas developments along North America's wildest edge. And in the European Arctic, he explores the new Cold War rising between Russia, China, Europe, and the United States over who controls the pole and will reap its riches as the ice melts. What Shea finds is not one Arctic but many—all still linked by shattering cold, seasons of darkness, and a pure, inimitable light.


Bootstrapped





Before 2020, American Indian reservations made up roughly 55 million acres of land in the United States. Nearly 200 million acres are reserved for national forests—in the emergence of this great nation, our government set aside more land for trees than for Indigenous peoples. That changed on July 9, 2020, when a high-profile Supreme Court case—which originated with a smalltown murder two decades earlier-affirmed the reservation of Muscogee Nation. The ruling resulted in the largest restoration of tribal land in U.S. history, merely because the Court chose to follow the law.

In By the Fire We Carry, Rebecca Nagle tells the story of the generations-long fight for tribal land and sovereignty in Eastern Oklahoma. 
On a Move

Philadelphia's Notorious Bombing and a Native Son's Lifelong Battle for Justice

Founded in 1972 by a charismatic ideologue called John Africa, MOVE's mission was to protect all forms of life from systemic oppression. This Black-led civil liberties organization drew its ideology from the Black Panther Party and pre-dated animal and environmental rights groups like PETA and Earth First. MOVE members lived together in a collection of West Philadelphia row houses and took the surname Africa out of admiration for the group's founder.

But in MOVE's lifestyle, city officials saw threats to their status quo. Their bombing of MOVE homes shocked the nation and made international news. Eleven people were killed, including five children. *On a Move* is one of the most unimaginable stories of injustice and resilience in recent American history.




A Deaf Memoir of Voice


Black, White, Colored

The Hidden Story of an Insurrection, a Family, a Southern Town, and Identity in America

Lauretta Malloy Noble and LeeAnet Noble

In the late nineteenth century, Laurinburg, North Carolina, was a beacon of racial calm—a place where Blacks and Whites could live and work together. Black families like the Malloys became landlords, businessmen, and doctors. But that progress was shattered on the eve of Election Day, 1898, when supremacist groups launched a bloody attack, forcing Laurinburg's Black citizens to flee. This bloody race riot was the only recorded insurrection, stripping middle-class Blacks—who made strides during Reconstruction of their seats on every electoral board.

Black, White, Colored is the first book to tell the story of the events in Laurinburg and its impact on the town's Black occupants. Descendants Lauretta Malloy Noble and LeeAnét Noble carefully piece together that fateful event and its aftermath, providing compelling details of how their family became one of this Southern town's richest and most powerful despite slavery, violent white supremacist groups, floods, war, and other roadblocks to success.





At the start of WWII, the United States found itself in desperate need of an intelligence agency. The Office of Strategic Services (OSS), a precursor to today's CIA, was quickly formed. To fill its ranks with experts, the agency turned to academia for recruits. Suddenly, literature professors, librarians, and historians were training to perform undercover operations and investigative work—and these unexpected spies would go on to profoundly shape both the course of the war and modern spy craft.

Author Elyse Graham draws on personal histories, diaries, and declassified files to tell the stories of unforgettable characters like Joseph Curtiss, a literature professor who hunted down German spies and turned them into double agents; Sherman Kent, a history professor who rose to become the head of analysis for all of Europe and Africa; and Adele Kibre, an archivist who was sent to Stockholm to secretly acquire documents.




The Language of Fanaticism


Screen People



Megan Garber explains how today's internet-inflected culture conditions us to see one another not as people but as characters in an ongoing show. 
How a Color Tells the Story of My People

Students will accompany Imani Perry on an intellectual journey on the role of the color blue in Black life which weaves together social and cultural history, art, music, politics, and activism, as well as her own experiences and family memories.

Imani reveals how blue has been uniquely and closely intertwined with Blackness since it first emerged as a concept in the era of slavery, when dyed blue cloths were traded for human life in West Africa, and later when the booming business of farming indigo in the South led directly to Georgia legalizing slavery. She returns to Louis Armstrong's question of "What did I do to be so Black and blue?," tracing the emergence of blues music and its evolving legacy. She considers the blueberry bushes that grew in her own grandmother's backyard and the questions of migration, homeland, and sustenance that they evoke for her.

An insert of color photos across eight pages highlights artists across different mediums and the diaspora that reiterate the book's theme while providing visual context and examples of the expansiveness of the color blue.








Mental Immunity

Infectious Ideas, Mind-Parasites, and the Search for a Better Way to Think

Andy Norman

In Mental Immunity, Andy Norman shows that these phenomena share a root cause. We live in a time when the so-called "right to your opinion" is thought to trump our responsibilities. The resulting ethos effectively compromises mental immune systems, allowing "mind parasites" to overrun them. Conspiracy theories, evidencedefying ideologies, garden-variety bad ideas: these are all species of mind parasite, and each of them employs clever strategies to circumvent mental immune systems. In fact, some of them compromise cultural immune systems - the things societies do to prevent bad ideas from spreading. Norman shows why all of this is more than mere analogy: minds and cultures really do have immune systems, and they really can break down. Fortunately, they can also be built up: strengthened against ideological corruption. He calls for a rigorous science of mental immune health- what he calls "cognitive immunology"- and explains how it could revolutionize our capacity for critical thinking.

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


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
